running prime time dramas for the BBC, ITV and other independent production companies. Her credits include *Eastenders*, *The Bill*, and *Hustle*. As a writer she has been selected to take part in a number of development programs including Arista's Scribes (feature film development), the UK Film Council's Blank Slate scheme (short films) and Critical Mass at the Royal Court Theatre. Her full length play, *Still Life*, is, at present, in development with Kali Theatre Company. Her short fiction can be found in the anthology, *And the World Changed*, *The South Asian Review* and *The Normal School*.
