

Thank you for your interest in the Doctor of Nurse Anesthesia Practice (DNAP) program is currently operating using guidelines from the Council on Accreditation of Nurse Anesthesia Educational Programs (COA) to become a Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist (CRNA)

This program has been determined to **meet** the requirements for National Certification as a CRNA.

Upon interview application students will have orientation prior to acceptance to understand that once your didactic learning ends you may have to rotate amongst multiple states to satisfy your clinical rotations. In addition, you must maintain California, Arizona and Texas licensure in duration of the program. Students must be able to pass background checks in all States they wish to study. Students must be aware that certain misdemeanors and felonies will make this impossible. Students should check with RN Boards prior to enrollment. All scheduling for rotations will be 6-9 months in advance so that student may obtain essential licensure.

Students must maintain 1 million to 3-million-dollar liability insurance during program.

In addition to the educational requirements, graduates of this program will need to also meet additional requirements established by the including continuing passing exams and supervised hours to apply for a licensure
